From the Back Platform

Another year in the books! 2023 was a time of great progress at the Pacific Southwest Railway Museum Association. There were many noteworthy events and accomplishments in the past year that are worth looking back upon. In 2023, we hosted four quarterly members lectures at the La Mesa Police Department. These lectures covered a wide range of interesting topics relating to local railroad history. The lectures can be attended in person or live-streamed via Zoom. The three most recent lectures were also recorded and are available to view at any time on the museum's YouTube channel at: https://www.youtube.com/@psrmrailway

Speaking of YouTube and social media, we have been taking full advantage of the power of social media this year, thanks to the dedicated efforts of our Social Media Lead, Jason Drenkow. Jason actively maintains our Facebook page, Instagram account, and YouTube channel. Jason has been amassing a large collection of pictures and videos taken at our museum showing volunteers at work, museum visitors, regular museum operations, and special events. These, in combination with our extensive photographic collections housed in the Southwest Railway Library, have provided more than enough material for Jason to keep a steady social media content pipeline going. Although social media content is no substitute for an in-person visit to our museum, it is a great form of outreach. Interesting and wellcurated social media content can reach a much wider audience than many traditional forms of advertising, all for very little if any cost. Some of our posts on Instagram have garnered tens of thousands of views from around the world, with some even getting over 200,000 views. If even a fraction of the viewers decides to visit the museum in the future, then the social media posts will have been worth it! We have already seen great results from posts promoting our special events.

2023 was our second year of membership in the San Diego Museum Council. This organization is an alliance of museums and cultural organizations from around San Diego County and our membership includes direct benefits for you! In February, members of the general public were able to pick up passes that grant 50% off admission at all participating museums including ours.

Remember that as PSRMA members, museum admission and Golden State train rides are always free for you! In the first half of May, PSRMA participated in the Museum Council's Big Exchange. This program granted free reciprocal admission to members of all participating museums. This meant that PSRMA members were granted free admission to nearly 80 museums in San Diego County! PSRMA will be participating in both Museum Month and the Big Exchange again in 2024. Don't miss out on this chance to receive free or discounted admission to the many other wonderful museums located throughout our county!

In February, we invited museum members and the public to ride behind Coaster 2103 on its official inaugural run and gave a short talk on the locomotive. The event was well-attended and we operated 2103 many times again throughout the year. In early 2024, we plan to do a members lecture on Coaster 2103 in conjunction with another run day with the locomotive. In April, we operated our annual Bunny Trains and a chartered memorial train for our departed friend and local railfan-turned-railroader, Will Ayers.

In May, we co-hosted the second annual "Campo Days" event in Campo alongside the Motor Transport Museum, Mountain Empire Historical Society, and Camp Lockett Event and Equestrian Facility. PSRMA brought numerous outside vendors and performers onto the property and hosted many fun family activities in addition to our regular train rides. We also experimented with bringing local food vendors onto the property, which was a great hit! We subsequently brought the food vendors back onto the property a few times during the summer and the Pumpkin Express Season. This has been a great collaboration as it helps local businesses and gives museum visitors more food options during their visit to Campo. In 2024, we intend to make Campo Days an even bigger event. In particular, we want to make this a railfan-oriented event. We plan to roll out as much of our restored equipment as possible and either put it on display at Campo Depot or operate it on the Golden State Trains.

I already detailed our progress on the restoration of SP 3709 in last month's edition of the Hot Scoop so I won't rehash that again this month. The other major restoration project in 2023 was the reupholstery of the seats in our Chair Car, UP 576. This project could actually be classified as the tail-end of a restoration project

that started over ten years ago. Those of you who have been museum members since then may recall that UP 576 underwent a two-year restoration project during 2012 and 2013. During that project, the steel car body underwent extensive repairs to cut out and replace rusted out sheet metal panels and corner posts. Water damaged interior walls and insulation were replaced. The car's electrical system was overhauled. The air brake system was rebuilt. And finally, the car was partially repainted. The major items left untouched during that restoration were the seats.

Due to their complexity and the costs involved, the seats were left unrestored so that the car could be pressed into service in time for the 2013 North Pole Limited season. However, the seats' old foam and horse hair stuffing was deteriorating and they had to be sheathed in seat covers to make them presentable to the riding public. In 2022, museum volunteer Mark Landguth embarked on an extensive project to research and scope out the materials needed to reupholster the seats. With input from the Board, he eventually settled on custom fabric that is as close to the original material as possible. In 2023, PSRMA received a \$50,000 grant from the County of San Diego for the reupholstery project. Over a six-month period, a couple seat pairs were removed at a time and sent into town to be reupholstered. The metal footrests and trim on the seats were also separately removed and sent in to be re-chromed. Mark wrapped the project up just in time for the car to operate on the 2023 North Pole Limited trains.

Speaking of the North Pole Limited, this year's season went exceptionally well! Over the course of eight nights, we operated 16 nearly sold-out trains full of happy families on a journey to visit Santa Claus! We carried just over 4,200 passengers for the season and grossed over \$200,000! The income from NPL gives us a strong financial foundation going into 2024. Thank you to the many volunteers who worked tirelessly to make this season a success, especially those who were at Campo every single night of the event! If volunteerism in 2024 permits, we hope to offer even more North Pole Limited and holiday-themed trains.

Lastly, we kicked off a major track rehabilitation project late in 2023. I've already detailed the scope and

necessity of that project in the previous two editions of the Hot Scoop. As of writing this our contractor, RailWorks, is nearing completion of the rehabilitation project between Campo and Canyon. Although it's not looking like we will be able to include the rehabilitation of the track between Canyon and Division onto this project, we have a much better idea of the costs involved in getting trains back to Division. In 2024, we will be exploring funding options to make that project a reality.

Looking ahead to 2024, we are planning to expand our special event offerings throughout the year. In addition to our regular annual holiday-themed trains and Campo Days, we plan to begin operating beer and wine trains, pending approval of our on-train alcoholic beverage license. We're also looking to offer some more railfan-oriented events.

Are you still trying to come up with some New Year's Resolutions? How about becoming a volunteer at the Pacific Southwest Railway Museum Association? We have needs for volunteers in all areas including administrative work, equipment maintenance and restoration, facilities work, curation and exhibit building, docents, special events, train operations, website maintenance, and more! Many volunteer activities are performed at the museum in Campo or at the La Mesa Depot. Others can be done from the comfort of your own home. Sound appealing? 


U.S. Army 1401 returns to SP 3709

Facilities Projects – Looking back on 2023, looking forward to 2024

We are always thankful for the many volunteers who assisted in keeping our site in Campo plus the La Mesa Depot looking good while making improvements to the plant. The members also stepped forward to financially back that effort this year well.

In February, and again in October, members purchased new plastic park benches for Campo.

Steven Pohjola, Brian Elmore, Jim Lundquist,
Pablo Martinez & David Choy assembled
them.

March found Steven Pohjola, Jim Lundquist and Glen Rogers reinstalling the western portion of track 1 at Campo as well as Pablo Martinez and Jim replacing panels on the Shop Building which had blown off.

In April, Frank Denison, Timothy Miller and Jim Lundquist sanded the La Mesa Depot in preparation for painting.

May had contractors painting the La Mesa Depot while volunteers Frank Denison, Jim Lundquist and Dawn Lundquist replaced emergency lights in the Exhibit Hall.

In July, we hired contractors to replace the clear panels on the roof of the Exhibit Hall.

September found the installation of drainage near the horse barn by Brian Elmore and Jim Lundquist with assistance from Roark Stump after Glen Rogers had spent much time construction a driveway around the barn. For ten days in October, Frank Denison and Jim Lundquist rebuilt the lunchroom exterior wall with new windows and supporting studs.

The final project for 2023 started in November and continued into December with the replacement of the walking path over a drainage ditch from Railroad Museum to the Exhibit Hall. Brian Elmore, Gabe Larson, Jim Lundquist, Frank Denison, Bruce Semelsberger, Dawn Lundquist and Steven Pohjola worked on this project, the photos of which are in shown below.

In addition to these specific projects, there are always ongoing efforts, like the weekly clean-up of the grounds by Pablo and Roark; tree trimming by Jim Lundquist, Steven Pohjola and Frank Denison and dragging the driveways and parking lots by Glen Rogers.

In 2024, plans are underway to restart work on the Early California History mine train, major tree trimming and continuing to remove junk from our property. As always, funding is an issue for these projects, but, one improvement we know will happen are new picnic tables at the Campo Depot. There is a very large drainage project which will move forward once grant funds are released. We hope that the planning effort for a new building could start as well.
